Planning Begins for Organ Restoration

The time has come! St. Andrew's organ, a 1926 three manual Hall pipe organ, is over 91 years old and in much need of restoration.

In August, St. Andrew's contracted with Darrell Rison, our former interim organist, to manage the organ restoration project. He is currently in contact with several organ companies to solicit proposals, as well as organists who are familiar with the instrument and know its current issues and limitations.

Darrell will present recommendations to the vestry this fall, after which we will move forward with a formal contract to complete the work.

The cost of this project will be covered using a fund designated for major organ repairs and restoration, currently around \$55,000. Details about this project will be shared as they become available. Stay tuned!
